Meeting Highlights

1. Health Humanitarian update

Casualties:

From 30 March until 31 May 2019, 312 people have been killed¹. The total figure of people injured stands at 29,574². Out of 29,574 people injured, 14,870 were treated at the TSPs and discharged. This has reduced the burden of casualties arriving at the hospitals by an average of 46%. The remaining 17,503 casualties arrived at the emergency departments (ED) of MoH and NGO hospitals. Of them, 3,615 were children.

Gunshot injuries: Out of 17,503 casualties that arrived to emergency departments (ED), 7,110 cases were gunshot injuries; which account for 41% of the total casualties arriving at the hospitals. From 7,110 gunshot injuries, 87% are limb gunshot injuries.

Permanent disability:

 Amputations: 138 amputations have taken place as a result of injuries during the mass demonstrations, including 30 in children. 120 were lower limb amputations and 18 upper limb amputations³.

Drugs and medical supplies

- According to the MoH, 252 items (49%) out of the essential medications were reported at less than one-month supply at the MoH Central Drug Store (CDS), out of which 214 items (41%) are totally depleted, and 207 items (24%) out of the medical disposables in the essential list were reported at zero stock levels in the CDS, affecting negatively the health service delivery at both primary and secondary level.
- MoH reported that 56% out of the 936 essential laboratory items are at zero stock levels in the Central Laboratory and Blood Bank Department, e.g. 52 items out of the 99 used in emergency, ICU and Operation Theatre are out of stock. Similarly, 19 out of 50 Blood Bank items are at zero stock, all of which affects negatively the early and correct diagnosis and treatment of various diseases. MoH calls for support in fulfilling the gaps in drugs, disposables and laboratory reagents shortages.
- WHO supported the coordination of Hilum Gas entrance to MoH and one NGO health facilities to operate the RMI machines within these facilities.

Electricity

The electricity situation has improved given the recent efforts to connect the grid lines to nine out of the 14 public hospitals, including Al Shifa, Indonesia, Al Aqsa, Nasser, Al Dora, Ophthalmic Hospital, Paediatric, Psychiatric, Specialized Paediatric Hospital. These hospitals now have access to up to 22 hours of electricity every day.

Funding

- In order to respond to the growing health needs in Gaza, the Health Cluster requires a total of \$28.2 million. Out of this, \$16.2 million has been received, leaving a funding gap of \$12 million.
- An additional \$1.5 million is required to ensure the minimum needed resources are available to prepare for and respond to the first 96 hours of a potential escalation.
- The Health Cluster oPt Humanitarian Response Plan, requires a total of \$ 42 million USD and only 30% has been funded by the end of May.

Attacks against Health

From 30 March 2018 to 31 May 2019, three health workers have been killed and 755 injured in 473 recorded incidents against health staff and facilities. 106 ambulances were damaged, as well as 10 other forms of health transport and 7 health facilities (including 3 medical points).

Access for patients referred out of Gaza

As of 31 May 2019, according to Gaza's Coordination and Liaison Office, there had been 554 applications to Israeli authorities by those injured in demonstrations to exit Gaza via Erez crossing to access health care. Of those applications, 18% were approved, 27% were denied and 55% were delayed.

De-confliction

OCHA and the ACU have established a consolidated system for the de-confliction of humanitarian locations in Gaza. Agencies that wish to provide their details of humanitarian locations to the Israeli authorities for the purpose of de-confliction, can register and upload the locations on the Emergency Coordination Portal (ECP) which can be accessed from http://www.accesscoordination.org/dbs/ECP/

Rehabilitation

As many partners are working on the rehabilitation services, the Health Cluster initiated the rehabilitation task force, and asked Humanity and Inclusion (HI) to lead this task force. The Health Cluster will call for the first meeting before the middle of July 2019, and HI will pursue the lead and report to the Trauma Working Group, that will report to the Health Cluster.

Drug Monitoring

- To monitor the drugs availability and to ensure that the donated drugs and supplies are well received by the MoH in Gaza, particularly those sent by Ramallah Central Drugs Store, the Humanitarian Coordinator, MoH and UNOPS agreed to initiate a monitoring system that can be conducted by UNOPS and supported by Health Cluster, and involve the flowing points primarily:
 - Confirming arrival of supplies at Karm Abu Salem
 - Confirming arrival of supplies at MoH warehouses and counting/recording them in detail
 - Confirming distribution of supplies from main MoH warehouse to other warehouses and/or health facilities
 - Regular inventory checks at MoH warehouses
 - Spot checks of inventory at health facilities

3. Maternal, Infant and Young Child Nutrition (MIYCN) in emergencies 2019-2022 Action Plan

UNICEF updated the partners on the status of Maternal, Infant and Young Child Nutrition in Gaza, flagging the increase of malnutrition and anaemia among pregnant women and children, and decrease in exclusive breast feeding. MoH supported the findings of UNICEF and Save Children assessment and highlighted the need for nutritional supplements to meet the need of the micronutrient deficiency among children. 4. Update of Sexual and Reproductive Health (SRH) in Gaza

UNFPA updated the partners on Sexual and Reproductive Health in Gaza, highlighting the increase in maternal mortality and the shortages in family planning supply.
